previous research has found that women continue to experience chronic gender discrimination work family conflict and incivility despite the increase in public policy to decrease these experiences cortina kabat farr leskinen huerta magley 2013 kessler 2001 lord 2010 as cited in sue sue 2013 pascoe richman 2009 further these experiences have been linked to a number of negative outcomes while these have been studied in numerous populations the research regarding female clinical psychologists experiences of gender discrimination work family conflict and selective incivility has been sparse clinical psychologists in particular must maintain a certain level of self care and well being in order to be maximally effective working with their clients wise hersh gibson 2012 therefore it is pertinent to understand female clinical psychologists experiences with these issues the present study examined female clinical psychologists and clinical psychology graduate students experiences with three predictor variables i e gender discrimination work family conflict and incivility and how these constructs related to each other as well as two outcome variables i e well being and burnout three hypotheses were presented one hundred forty five female clinical counseling and other practicing psychologists as well doctoral students in clinical psychology programs were recruited via word of mouth e mail and posting on the facebook page for the association for women in psychology the final sample for analysis included 130 participants who completed measures of gender discrimination work family conflict selective incivility well being and burnout via an online survey results revealed while controlling for demographics everyday gender discrimination frequency and major gender discrimination frequency and distress were positively related to work to family conflict family to work conflict selective incivility and burnout additionally work to family conflict family to work conflict and selective incivility while controlling for demographics were each negatively related to general well being and positively related to burnout the strengths and limitations of the present study as well as implications for future research are discussed
